Parish Council Update

The Parish Council wishes all Ogbourne St George good health and happiness for 2025 and hopes that this year has started well for everyone.

Parish Council Meetings: The first Parish Council meeting of 2025 has already taken place at which there was much debate about village interests and plans for this year. Meetings take place in the Village Hall at 7.30pm, and the next meetings are on 13 March and 8 May. Annual Budget: The Council discussed the budget as presented. The annual running costs are similar to the previous year with some inflationary increases. A further £2,000 will be requested to increase the Earmark provision for Special Projects in 2025/26, as the Council anticipates projects involving the Bell Field and the Playground, along with inflation in the operating budget. The Council agreed to the precept request for 2025/26, which includes the increased amount of £2,000. This will be £69.56 For a Band D House, an increase of £8.66 per year (14.22%).

Parish Council Elections: Parish Council elections are due in May 2025, and villagers are invited to apply to join and become a voice for your village. There is an existing vacancy and no guarantee that current members will apply for re-election.

Your involvement ensures improving local services, preservation of our environment and a thriving community for all. Road Concerns

In light of recent traffic issues in the village due to road closures on the A346, we are once again raising our concerns to Wiltshire Council as well as looking at other avenues. We would also like to ask residents who park on the High Street, especially past the school where the road narrows, to kindly alleviate the congestion by moving their cars to the Church car park temporarily wherever possible to facilitate the traffic. It is a stressful situation for all involved and your help and cooperation is greatly appreciated.

Installation of the new Speed Indicator Device ("SID")

The Parish Council would like to thank those residents who installed the new SID. It provides background as to why it has located the second SID there.

Back in December 2020 Wiltshire Council conducted a traffic survey in four areas of the village to ascertain whether the speed limit should/could be reduced. These were Lower High Street, Upper High Street, Marlborough Road North and Marlborough Road South. In each of these areas, results showed that no speed limit reduction was warranted, as the traffic speeds sat within the accepted threshold. So, as a Parish Council we looked at other ways to make our roads safer. Given the traffic speed results of the survey, the only one of the four areas where we could put a SID was Marlborough Road South. Over the 7 days, 41.5% of vehicles travelling down this stretch of road were over the posted speed limit - which warranted our intervention.

Chiseldon Local History Group

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 19 February in the Church Hall, Butts Rd, SN4 0NN at 7.30 pm on 'The River at War' in which Bill King will talk about the River Thames' strategic role in World War II.

Between 1940 and 1945 London suffered 253 night-time raids and 101 daytime raids by the German Luftwaffe, with 80,000 casualties. Even during night-time blackouts, the bomber navigators could easily identify their target due to the distinctive shape of the Thames, and the enemy knew how important the Port of London was to Britain's economy which made London's docks a key target. What is almost forgotten, and was almost unknown at the time, was the work of the Thames-Flood Prevention Emergency Repairs service, the London County Council's rapid response unit whose work proved essential in keeping the capital functional.
