Chiseldon Local History Group

The next meeting is on Wednesday 20 July in the Church Hall at 7.30pm. Mike Pringle will talk on "Richard Jefferies – a relationship with the land". Richard Jefferies was a 19th Century nature writer, noted for his depiction of English rural life in essays, books of natural history, and novels. He was born at Coate and spent much of his childhood and early adult life wandering the local countryside and capturing his thoughts on paper. He was a journalist for the North Wiltshire Herald and published 19 books, many drawing on his experiences of the local area. His childhood home is now a museum, and he is also commemorated with a Chiseldon street name and a memorial stone near Barbury Castle.

Meetings are now open to all at a cost of £1 per attendee. A schedule of meetings for 2022 is in place, with speakers confirmed each month through to November.

Chiseldon Museum is open for the 2022 season, on every Saturday from 2-4 p.m. until the end of September, at The Old Chapel, Butts Road, SN4 ONW. There are new displays on the History of the Burderop Estate, famous entertainers who appeared at Chiseldon Camp, and on local Churches and Chapels.
