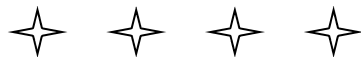

Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council

The Parish Council held its AGM on May 8th. 9 members of the public attended. Tim Frost retired as Chairman and Keith Wallace was elected the new Chairman. Martin Groves was re-elected as vice chairman and all the councillors, including two new ones, signed their Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

Under matters arising the Clerk has asked the Rights of Way department at WCC to resolve the issue of the bridleway that is blocked at Meadow Cottage. This is still pending. Councillor Willis reported that installation of goal posts in the Bell Field will be delayed until after harvest because of access. The Clerk has arranged for the Parish Council notice board to be repaired and it will soon be re-installed. He has also been in touch with Thames Water regarding the fallen tree in the river bed close to the pumping station. This is not their responsibility so he will now contact the Environment Agency.

Other matters raised included an investigation into whether the light output of the suggested replacement street lights will be comparable to the existing luminaires. Councillor Smith will investigate. There was also a detailed discussion as to whether the Parish Council is responsible for implementing the forthcoming smoking ban in the bus shelters. It was agreed to investigate further and if necessary place no smoking notices in the bus shelters prior to July 1st. The Clerk will request guidance from Kennet DC. **Next meeting Thursday July 12th.**

Annual Parish Meeting of Ogbourne St George

The Annual Parish Meeting followed the Parish Council AGM. The Chairman's report was given by Tim Frost. He reported that the precept had remained the same and that the Parish Council had looked at 24 planning applications during the year none of which were controversial. He thanked the councillors for their work in helping him and on behalf of the village. The Clerk presented the Financial report showing that a total of £5170 was brought forward from 2005/6 which together with the precept of £3500 and a VAT refund gave a total available for the year of £9415.

Charlotte Frost presented the Village Hall report. She reported that it is used by the School, the Little Dragons Pre School and the toddlers group. It has also been used by the school for other activities and for fund raising by the Friends of Ogbourne School. Kick boxing classes continue and there were 13 hirings for private events. New wash hand basins have been installed and the toilets have been tiled. This work was financed by the Little Dragons.

There was a report on the Poor's Gorse Charity fund. The committee is due to have a meeting in the summer with the Charity Commission to determine whether the use of the funds can be varied.

Other Matters. Sid Bolt was thanked for generously giving up his time to mow the Coronation Garden. It was reported that the railings along Church Lane and on the path to the bus stop on the main road need repair. These are items on the Highways list for action. A villager asked for bus timetables to be shown on the bus shelters. Councillor Rouse said he would look into it.

There was discussion on the possible introduction of a parish website as a source of information to villagers. The former Chairman, Tim Frost, agreed to attend a future meeting to discuss this in more detail.
